





Bayville Water Department

Pine Lane water main job was successfully installed by Alessio Pipe and the project was completed in August 2025. The project received final health department approval. The water main has been in service for more than a month.

Sixth Street and First Avenue drainage job was successfully completed by Alessio in July 2025. Installation of new catch basins, approximately 300 feet of drainage pipe and connected to the Nassau County storm water system. They also relocated watermain on Bayville Ave and did final road restoration.
